#### MUSEUM STUDIES November, 2012:

Table from a 2012 Ph.D. dissertation on MS Programs from the University of Alabama attached: Graduate Museum Studies Curricula: Meeting the Needs of the Field by W.F. Bomar. Places the SFSU program MS in national framework.

The table looks at all MS programs in the US that offer the MA degree, a certificate, or both, from 2004—2010, using statistics from the National Center for Education Statistics on 40 MS Programs.

Mean number of graduates over the 7 years listed below.

The top schools for producing Museum Studies MA graduates in the US are:

#1 George Washington University: mean number of graduates per year is 52, with 18 full and part-time faculty and a few staff members. It's the most prestigious and best-known program in the field.

#2 SFSU: mean number of graduates per year is 22.

#3 Cooperstown: mean number of graduates per year is 19, with 4 full-time faculty and several staff. It's also prestigious and highly regarded, with more of an emphasis on history.

#4 University of Washington, Seattle: mean number of graduates per year is 17, with 2 full-time faculty, but with 20 or so faculty from other departments teaching courses. They also have a few staff members, including one whose entire job involves internship coordination. It is also very well-regarded program.

#5 John F. Kennedy University, Berkeley: mean number of graduates per year is 15, with at least 2 full-time and 10 part-time faculty. It's also well regarded.
